Continuation of FY 22/23 Budget Requests: Mr. Loventhal reported that the grant funding letter authored by Chair Fields and approved by the Commission was forwarded to City Council. The letter was not discussed during the Council meeting. Mr. Loventhal further reported that due to the current fiscal state, City Council is taking a conservative approach. If there is a specific funding, or project request from the Commission, Council may consider funding these types of projects on a case-by-case basis.

GOOD OF THE GAME (Ideas and events of what is happening in Campbell):

Commissioner Kaufman reported that there is a Campbell Chamber Golf Tournament on August 24 at 10am at the Cinnabar Hills Golf Club. A box lunch and dinner are provided. He also reported that there are sponsorship and volunteer opportunities.

COMMISSIONER/SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS:

Campbell Cares/Neighborhood Refresh Project: Mr. Loventhal reported that the city attorney had no significant concerns for the concept of the project. The city attorney will need to review any required agreements, and need to obtain consent from the homeowners, liability waivers, etc.

Capture Campbell: Commissioner Yoshikawa the project is progressing slowly. The committee will meet next week and may decide to extend the deadline out 30 days to give the students more time. They have received \$200 in donations and are still fundraising. They are gathering judges (two have responded) Commissioner Naylor has contacted school districts and have not been successful.

Explore Art Project: Commissioner Kaufman reported that the next steps would be to fundraise through private donations. They are hoping for more funding and more details on the mural project by the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:18 pm. The next Regular Meeting of the Civic Improvement Commission is scheduled for Thursday, August 11, 2022, at 7:30 pm and will be conducted pursuant to the provisions of the Brown Act.

One of the best examples of the power of unity is the organizing efforts by the United Farm Workers (UFW) beginning in the mid-1960s. SCCLD is proud to announce UFW co-founder Dolores Huerta will be the focus of a new exhibit at Gilroy Library.

The exhibit, titled [Dolores Huerta: Revolution in the Fields/Revolución en los Campos](#), was organized by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service in collaboration with the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery and will be featured in the **Gilroy Library from Saturday, November 5, 2022 through Monday, January 23, 2023**. This exhibition received federal support from the Latino Initiatives Pool, administered by the Smithsonian Latino Center.

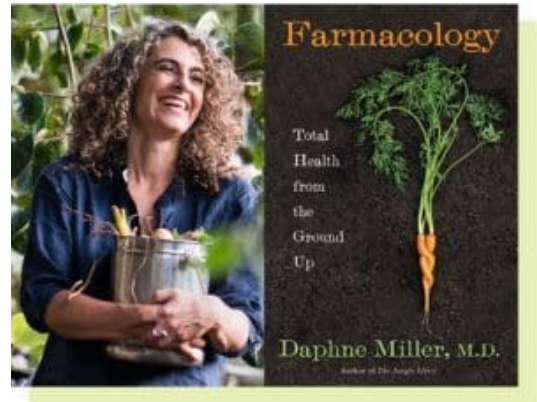

Council Policy X.XX
***DRAFT* Code of Conduct Policy**
City of Campbell Board Members & Commissioners

Policy Purpose:

The purpose of this policy is to establish rules for individuals who serve on one of the City of Campbell's (City) boards or commissions when there is a perceived conflict of interest with an item that is being or will be considered by the City Council or any City board or commission. The provisions of this policy are in addition to any ethical obligations imposed by applicable law

Perceived Conflict of Interest:

A member of a City board or commission shall not participate in any decision in which the member has a perceived conflict of interest as defined in this policy.

A perceived conflict of interest means a situation where a member of a City board or commission is affiliated with a person or organization that has taken a position on a matter coming before the City Council or any City board or commission and the member would appear, to a reasonable and well-informed person, to have aligned his/her interest with that person or organization in such a way that would affect the independence, impartiality and objectivity of the member's role as a City board member or commissioner.

Prohibited actions involving a perceived conflict of interest by member of a City board or commission include:

- Representing, appearing for, or speaking on behalf of a person or organization with which the member is affiliated on a matter that has come or will come before the City Council or any City board or commission; or
- Representing, appearing for, or speaking on behalf of a person or organization with which the member is affiliated before another governmental agency on a matter pending before that governmental agency that has come or will come before the City Council or any City board or commission, and on which the City has not made a final decision.
